

Today, I am keenly aware that after twenty years of parish ministry, this is my final Lakeside Reflections. Lately, I have experienced a number of moments when I realize, "Oh, this is the last time I will ..." Bitter-Sweet only just begins to describe my emotions. I am living in the liminal time between finishing my call to parish ministry and beginning whatever lies in front of me in retirement. Joan Borysenko, PhD, expert in the mind-body connection, describes it perfectly: "liminal time [is] that pregnant pause between what is

The summer NNLB meal is almost upon us so here is the scoop on the various jobs we need to fill in order to pull this off:

Cooks for Chicken Drumsticks

Job entails rubbing a mixture under the skin and on top of the drumsticks, then baking the drumsticks for approx. 35 min. at 400 degrees. (Until fork poked into thick part of meat draws out clear juice.

Deliver the baked chicken to the Trinitarian Church (Main Street Church) at 12:30 p.m.

What is provided: 24 chicken drumsticks 2 aluminum trays rub mix (you add the oil.)

Pasta Salad Makers

Job entails creating a pasta salad containing veggies (such as peas, corn, beans, diced red peppers - whatever works in your recipe) that will provide 12 half cup servings.

Deliver the 12 containers to the Trinitarian Church at 12:30 p.m.

What is provided: 12 cups and lids

You contribute the salad.

Note: This weekend I will make a test-run version and share the ingredients and proportions with anyone who wants them.
