H.O.M.E. is involved in helping the homeless and also the working poor. Two such formerly homeless families have been assisted with down payments in purchasing their homes. Another is in progress. A playground is being built for children in the family shelter. Tracey stressed the necessity of involving the people in determining and carrying out the various projects. She is offering a tour on June 26th to interested UUCC folks. There are many different pieces of the H.O.M.E. mission.

Another effort, supported by UUCC through the Collaborative Ministry, is headed by Robin Lovrien of Ellsworth UU. This will provide help to migrant blueberry farmworkers. Toiletries, gloves, shoes, warm clothing, bedding, etc., will be gathered and distributed at three sites. Items can be left at the Meeting House and will be delivered to Ellsworth before July 31st. Volunteer helpers are needed, too.

As we celebrate the joys of summer with various family gatherings, let us keep in mind the larger human family and the ways we can reach out through our Opportunity Fund Committee, the Collaborative Ministry, and our Castine lunch project headed by Brooke Tenney.

UUCC Opportunity Funds at Work in our Communities

There are two primary goals of the UUCC Opportunity Fund 1. making a financial difference and 2. congregational and community engagement.



On June 26th, at 9:30 in the morning, several members of the congregation met on the front porch of the Learning Center at **h.o.m.e., inc.** in Orland. Tracey Hair and three members of her staff met us there for a tour of the h.o.m.e. campus. Wow! There is so much more to h.o.m.e. than most of us realized. Just a short list: Leaning Center; Child Care Center; Men's shelter; Women's shelter (including young children); Playground (a new playground is coming soon thanks, in part, to Opportunity Fund support); Arts & Crafts Workshops—weaving, painting, leather, pottery, quilting & fabric art, and stained glass; chapel, bargain barn; craft store, sawmill and cedar shingle making workshop; and the lunch counter where brunch is served on Sunday and a wholesome healthy lunch is available Monday through Friday. warmth and commitment of the people at h.o.m.e. was all around the campus. Our investment in h.o.m.e. is making a difference. Open Door Recovery Center was founded by William (Bill) Hills.

Bill had a true passion for helping others find their way into recovery. As an outpatient counselor with the Kelly 6 Program at Eastern Maine Medical Center, Bill recognized the need for treatment in Hancock County. In 1984, a private donor provided seed money to begin Open Door Recovery Center. ODRC started in the basement of St.

Joseph's Church, Ellsworth, Maine providing quality treatment to those who suffered with the disease of addiction. In 1999 ODRC moved to its current location at 8 Old Mill Road in Ellsworth.

Our Mission at **Hills House** is to provide a safe, healthy, healing, loving environment for women who are committed to recovery from the disease of addiction and mental health disorders while pregnant and/or caring for their children age birth to ten years. At Open Door Recovery Center and Hills House one of our main goals is to treat the disease with the parents while keeping them unified and/or reunified with their young children.

Beyond Thoughts and Prayers. After the Sllence, Action.

June 21st, the Summer Solstice, is the longest period of daylight in the Northern Hemisphere. On that day, faith communities were called upon to open their places of worship for a vigil, **"The Longest Day Vigil"** in recognition that for separated families, every day apart is 'the longest day.' Castine held our interfaith vigil at Trinity Episcopal Church. About thirty people stopped by to pray, meditate and sit in silence to observe this moment. People were invited to sign up for a continuing conversation about what residents of Castine (yearround and seasonal) can do in response to the tragedies unfolding and continuing at our border.

The initial **conversation** is scheduled on Wednesday, **July 11th at 11:00 a.m.** at the UU Office & Meditation Room, 21 Main Street, Castine. Anyone is welcome to come. We will explore all the possible ways our Castine people might make a material and/or financial contribution toward relieving the suffering and coming to better ways of welcoming people to America. Come, let us reason together and make our way into the future with compassion and determination.

Collaborative Ministry News

Blueberry Rakers' Resource Fairs—Ellsworth and Blue Hill

The migrant blueberry rakers (primarily Haitians) who come to Hancock County every summer are vital to our local economy. These hard-working folks travel long distances to bring in the harvest and they usually travel very light. They live in camps far from towns and often do not have much in the way of food preparation facilities or time to shop. To support the rakers, Maine Mobile Health, in conjunc-

tion with the Unitarian- Universalist Church, St. Joseph's Catholic Church, and St. Andrew's Lutheran Church—all of Ellsworth, will hold three **Resource Fairs** for migrants who rake blueberries.

The projected dates of the Resource Fairs are:

July 31 (Tuesday) 4-9 PM---St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Ellsworth

August 2 (Thursday) (4-9 PM)---Blue Hill Grange

August 8 (Wednesday) (4-9 PM)---St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Ellsworth.

DONATIONS NEEDED:

- **Toiletries!!** ALL kinds—including feminine hygiene products—hair products, soaps, , toothpaste, toothbrushes, soaps, body washes, shaving supplies for men! – NEW please. Travel sizes are OK; regular and large sizes are especially welcome. Sunscreen, body lotions, powder, (e.g. Gold Bond),
- Bedding: comforters, blankets, pillows-sheets are OK, but less needed than warm bedding.
- **WARM clothes for WORK:** For men AND women: Flannel shirts, sweaters, sweatshirts, fleece items of any kind, sweat pants, long sleeved pullover shirts. Dress shirts and pants are generally NOT needed.
- Gloves—all kinds of work gloves in all sizes: NO mittens please.
- **Work shoes and boots/socks:** Work socks are ESPECIALLY welcome. Boots and sturdy shoes suitable for the fields or for working in the blueberry freezers—men's and women's.
- **Food:** Food generally needs to be items that can be cooked on minimal equipment or warmed up: CANNED food: beans—(NO **pinto beans**, nor **garbanzos**, please,)—black, red, white--- vegetables, fruit—PLAIN! Not too fancy!! Canned meat and fish; dry pasta and sauces; RICE, canned stews, simple soups! Canned fruit (low sugar or in juice).

Also: Peanut butter & Jelly/Jam-in VERY high demand!!, (basic flavors).

*Please note: exotic or gourmet foods are often left over and we are hard-pressed to find a destination for them. Please keep foodstuffs SIMPLE.

* Fresh foods are donated by local farms but more is always welcome on the days of the fairs!

We have storage available in advance of the fairs! Please contact Robin (contact info above) to have your donations picked up or to get questions answered. The DAY of each fair, we serve a hot meal of simple, good food—(e.g. macaroni and cheese or spaghetti, hearty meat stews, etc.) Perhaps you would like to donate cooked food—and even help serve it!

We'd LOVE to have you volunteer—an hour or all day! Please get in touch!
