Memorial Day in Castine



UUCC members and friends were among those who participated in the annual Memorial Day parade with stops at the town cemetery, common and dock. Dr. Lynn Parsons offered his reflections on Memorial Day.

These are his concluding words:

I hope you agree with me that no one, regardless political persuasion, ethnicity, religion, regional identity, or indeed their attitude toward war itself, can fail to be moved by their sacrifice, no matter how long ago it may have occurred.

All of them, including Henry Butler, Harrison Webster, and some of here today, were born into a world in which it was assumed that war was the exception, and peace was the rule. We now live in a different world, a world in which war is the rule, and peace is the exception. Leaders of nations great and small now pride themselves on the size of their arsenals and the number of their missiles.

Just weeks before he would become one of the last casualties of

the Civil War, Lincoln spoke words that are equally fitting for us today, as those he spoke at Gettysburg:

"Fondly do we hope; fervently do we pray, that this mighty scourge of war might pass away." We are still waiting for the scourge to pass.

While we wait, let us not fail to honor the memories of those who have served, and support those who **do** serve, and those who **will** serve, until that scourge is lifted.



Ann has been a church musician for many years and brings joy and flexibility to our Music Program. While hymns are familiar to Ann, our particular collection of hymns and music is new to her. UUCC Opportunity Funds at Work in our Communities

There are two primary goals of the UUCC Opportunity Fund 1. making a financial difference and 2. congregational and community engagement. This month, we feature two of our Opportunity Fund partners: H.O.M.E. in Orland and the Community Childhood Learning Place in Castine.



H.O.M.E., Inc. is more than many of us realized. The campus is bigger than we imagined. The number of lives improved, maybe even saved, is beyond our counting.

H.O.M.E. (Homeworkers Organized for More Employment) is a nonprofit organization founded in 1970 dedicated to keeping and enhancing the quality of life for low-income and homeless families.

Through services, stewardship of resources, and shared responsibility, we aim to bring forth new possibilities for food, jobs, shelter, low-income housing, education, and self-sufficiency.

Tracey Hair, Executive Director, recounts the experi-

ence of one family at H.O.M.E. Today, a single mother of two young boys moves into an apartment. Her pathway into homelessness was complicated, paved with trauma and loss. During her stay, she enrolled her boys back into school, secured an income and saved up for her first month's rent. Now, H.O.M.E.'s Navigator will work with the family for up to twelve months beyond their stay. We're so passionate about the people we meet each day, the people who come for food, for shelter and others who are just passing through for a rest. Their strength and resilience provide us with daily doses of inspiration. It's not hard to want to support the work H.O.M.E. in whatever ways we can. On Sunday, June 17th, Tracey Hair will be our Opportunity Fund guest in the pulpit. Please plan to be in church that day and hear Tracey's story and learn more about the work of H.O.M.E.

Community Childhood Leaning Place

Visit CCLP's building site (39 State Street) on Windmill Hill to see the new building rise-up using the foundation and the wood from the original water reservoir. The building, designed by Mohr and Todd of Charlottesville, VA and Southwest Harbor, ME, will be unique because of the round shape of the water tank foundation, multiple windows providing natural light into the rooms (infant/toddler, three/four, after school/community), art studio, office, and conference room). The three ac-

tivity rooms will have children's bathrooms, kitchenettes, and space to develop child-centered curriculum focused upon the children's interests.

Thanks to volunteers, Tom Ehrman, David Hassett, John Hassett, WG Sayre, and Nancy Sayre and the work of Roy Boys Plumbing and Heating the underground pipes have been laid and covered, the floor trusses

and wood covering over the utility room have been put into place. The next construction layer now in place is the blue insulating foam. Roy Boys will return to place the tubing for radiant floor heating and reinforcing metal will be installed over the foam and tubing. Once this is done the concrete slab will be poured. The next step.....build walls for the windows donated by Davis Family Foundation.

CCLP fund raising has reached 80% of the \$360,000.00 goal. Thank you to all wonderful people who donated money and time to make the quality environment for our children a reality.



Pulliam Grant Application Season is Underway

The deadline for applications for the 2019 Deborah Pulliam Social Justice Grants this year was June 1, 2018. If past practice means anything, they all come in at the last moment.

Our Social Justice Pulliam Grant Task Force could use a few good UU's to get us to the deadline for announcing the grants, which is September 1. As in the past, we will attempt to recruit members from the other Collaborative Ministry UU congregations to help us. Serving on the committee would mean committing to two or three summer meeting plus reviewing and evaluating the applications.

About a year ago the members of Margaret's Committee On Ministry, Anne Price, Anne Parsons, Emma Sweet, Peter Fairbanks and I briefly wondered how we could make sure food was available for those in need during the summer of 2017. Now, a year later we have moved beyond wondering.

With input from Anne Romans, Witherle Memorial Library Librarian, Irene Hall, Children's Librarian, Shelia Irvine, Adams School Principal, Jessica Rollerson and Tom Mason a plan to provide healthy snacks had been developed. Tom has offered to purchase individually wrapped items such as granola bars, small boxes of raisins, crackers and cheese and yogurts at Sam's Club. Irene Hall will make sure the items are available for any hungry child who visits the library during the summer.

One more item is needed. As summer is the season of fresh fruit we are looking for weekly donations of seasonal fruit starting Wednesday, June 20. Fruit may be taken directly to the library or left at church on Sunday and I will make sure it arrives at the library on Monday morning.

Lakeside Reflections June 2018

I've been pondering the presence, and absence, of joy. Does it seem as though the trials and tribulations of our days can suck the joy right out of life? It's not that my life is any more challenged or blessed than other lives. Maybe I'm just tired—tired of resisting and tired of the news and tired of the enormity of the responsibilities placed on all of us by our commitment to Black Lives Matter and Me Too! (now also Who's Next?). Maybe I lack

creativity, or determination, or sufficient spiritual practice and discipline. As my own response to this malaise, I sing to myself a song from my third grade Sunday School class. "I've got the Joy, Joy, Joy down in my Heart ... etc. Down in my Heart to Stay."

Not satisfied that I can cure myself and return to a joy-filled life, I consult the experts. His Holiness the Dali Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu—*The Book of Joy, Lasting Happiness in a Changing World.* They maintain the truth that we all know and resist --- there is no one and nothing to blame ... Joy is not a reflection of external factors, it is an attitude that we can adopt and hold on to even when we encounter suffering and distress. I'm curious to know what else these two spiritual giants will offer. I've decided to preach what I need to hear. Join me on June 10th when I use *The Book of Joy* as the sermon text. Let's see where we might go together in search of JOY!

Mary Oliver knows a thing or two about noticing the beauty that gives us Joy. Here is "Morning Poem" by Mary Oliver.

Every morning the world is created. Under the orange

sticks of the sun the heaped ashes of the night turn into leaves again

and fasten themselves to the high branches --and the ponds appear like black cloth on which are painted islands

of summer lilies.
If it is your nature
to be happy
you will swim away along the soft trails

for hours, your imagination alighting everywhere.

And if your spirit
carries within it
the thorn
that is heavier than lead --if it's all you can do
to keep on trudging ---

there is still somewhere deep within you a beast shouting that the earth is exactly what it wanted ---

each pond with its blazing lilies is a prayer heard and answered lavishly, every morning,

whether or not you have ever dared to be happy, whether or not you have ever dared to pray.

May we uncover the blessings and promises that living with Joy will bring.
