# Information and Notice of a Special Congregational Meeting

A few years ago, a "Parish House Design Committee" began exploring ways to provide offices for our minister and staff, adequate space for religious education and an expanded and updated kitchen. At a special meeting May 23, 2021, the congregation approved spending \$25,000 for a preliminary feasibility study to construct a new, two-story Parish House.

After plans were developed and costs clarified, the committee, after much deliberation, concluded that our endowment could not support both this ambitious building project and our ability to ensure both the future of the congregation and our continuing service to the broader community. We also discovered that UUCC did not hold title to either the buildings or the land, but the Castine Town Meeting on May 14, 2022, resolved this problem by voting to give the title to UUCC.

Our leased office space on Main Street was relinquished this April 2022, saving approximately \$13,000 per year. However, we are now faced with the necessity of creating suitable office space for Margaret Beckman and staff within the confines of the current footprint of the Parish House. At the same time, we also want to optimize the religious education room and the kitchen. Obviously, this huge design challenge requires input from professionals. Two architects were

approached, and the committee has chosen the architect we believe is most suited for this project.

The cost estimate for the development of a design and a contractor pricing plan for renovations to remodel the interior of the existing Parish House is \$27,500. The Building Account has \$15,000 that was not spent last year, so an additional \$12,500 is necessary to meet the cost of design and contractor pricing services for the proposed plan. The additional monies will require a congregational vote.

This letter is intended to provide information for your consideration. The date of Sunday, **June 5** has been set aside for a special congregational meeting to address your questions or concerns. After a general discussion, a vote will be taken to decide if UUCC wants to appropriate the necessary funds (\$12,500) to cover the cost of a feasibility study for the modification of the Parish House.

I look forward to seeing you at the discussion and vote. If you would like to contact me before June 5, please do so.

#### **Lakeside Reflections June 2022**

The morning after 22 people died and dozens were injured in Uvalde, Texas in a 4<sup>th</sup> grade classroom, my world at Green Lake is calm and still and a perfect reflection of the beauty of creation.



How can this be? How do we hold at once the terrible and the beautiful?

I think of Wendell Berry's poem, Peace of the Wild Things. When the horror and the pain and the violence of humanity becomes too much to bear, I go and lie down where the wood drake rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds. I recall the comfort of the Psalms and I go to rest beside the still waters where my soul might be restored. For a time. Then, I rise and meet the day and try to remain openhearted and compassionate.

We are heart-broken. We are sick with grief. We are frustrated. We are angry. We are exhausted with the repetition of platitudes and promises that seem to have no effect and no ability to prevent the next mass killing.

This is my home and your home. What do we do when we know that our home is not safe from reckless (or carefully planned) violence of the very worst kind?

The best I can offer is to stay honest, speak the truth, face the opposition and work to change our laws and culture that allow for the wanton killing of the innocent like our lives depend on our success, for surely the lives of so many do depend on our success. We advocate. We write. We make phone calls. We hold our elected representatives accountable. And yes, we send up prayers and we think with loving kindness of the suffering and grieving as often as we possibly can.

We gather. We light candles.

We share words of comfort and determination. We sing *Amazing Grace*. We hold each other in Love, because Love is the strongest thing we know. On the Town Common in Castine on the day after the terror, we gather. Again. We are tired of holding vigils. We must continue to hold



vigils. We light a candle. Then we get to work and always, we vote.

May you all find peace in your hearts and souls. May you all find a way to shift the energy of our world toward loving kindness and away from fear and hate.
