#### **Minister's Meanderings**

#### November 2024 Theme is REPAIR

Each month I get onto two zoom calls for Soul Matters, our thematic curriculum. We are the folks who build the resource list each month through brainstorming, and then all the congregations who use Soul Matters have worshipful pieces to support those themes. Two months prior, we gathered and shared quotes, poems, whole books, ideas, music, visual art—anything

regarding the theme is discussed. **First** worked we to compile these with Soul **Matters** Director, Scott Taylor, and then one month later, we fine-tuned it. We decided November is REPAIR because it is election month and brokenness is all around us.

The election has caused internal

strife for many, as well as divisiveness between friends, family, and neighbors. On Wednesday, November 6, I will be at the church from 2 to 4pm for you to come by. Light a candle, or eat a cookie, or share a prayer, regardless of election outcome, so that repair might begin.

Repair is also important to think about as November holds Thanksgiving Day. At its best, it is joyful as family and friends gather. At its hardest, repair is needed before gatherings can happen if those friend and family bonds are tenuous or have even been broken. Repair also might look like re-inventing how this Gratitude Day happens for you, entirely. Sometimes we must cast off old ways for repair to happen, and this may include moving on form troublesome relationships, too.



Mostly what I wish to impart on the subject of repair is that it is never too There is no late. right or wrong way to do it. Repair might be complete restoration of the brokenness, or the rebuilding of one small corner. However, and with whomever, vou might choose engage in repair as a

spiritual endeavor, do so by being kind to yourself, first. We cannot change another's mind or control the outcome of very much, but we can be in that space, spiritually, as we seek to repair the rough edges for a smoother tomorrow.






### UUCC READS Tuesdays at 3:30 p.m. on ZOOM

This week we will begin *The Missing Thread* by Daisy Dunn.

In this monumental work, Dunn reconceives our understanding of the ancient world by emphasizing women's roles within it. *The Missing Thread* never relegates women to the sidelines and is populated with well-known names such as Cleopatra and Agrippina, as well as the likes of Achaemenid consort Atossa and Olympias, a force in Macedon. Spanning three thousand years, the story moves from Minoan Crete to Mycenaean Greece, from Lesbos to Asia Minor, from the Persian Empire to the royal court of Macedonia, and concludes with Rome and its growing empire. The women of antiquity are undeniably woven throughout the fabric of history, and in *The Missing Thread* they finally take center stage.

NNLB effort. Add to that the always welcome camaraderie experienced as we face the challenge of making yet another meal come together. We seem to have struck upon a formula that is definitely working. Add to that the generosity of the Blue Hill Hannaford that provided us with 1/3 of our pork loins and all of our potatoes.

Our next meal preparation date is January 10th. Know that we always welcome new volunteers and look forward to working with you.
