FROM THE SEARCH COMMITTEE

Charged by the congregation on May 4, the Ministerial Search Committee held its first official gathering June 13 and 14. As has been reported, the committee members selected by the congregation and the board are Peter Fairbank, Elaine Gerard-Climo, Deborah Neve, Anne Parsons, Anne Price, Emma Sweet, and Brooke Tenney. We met Friday afternoon and evening with Rev. Olav Nieuwejaar, the UUA Ministerial Settlement Representative, to clarify our understanding of the search process.

Saturday morning and afternoon, activities facilitated by Rev. Nieuwejaar included getting to better know each other and ourselves and to establish guidelines for working together over the next fifteen months. Many complex tasks are involved in a UUA search and roles were defined, assigned, and accepted. Debby is our chair and primary external contact; she will report at least once a month to the congregation during Sunday announcements and monthly to the Board. I will convey information to the congregation through this newsletter and our website. Emma will oversee a dedicated informational bulletin board in the Parish House.

At this early stage, we need to collect as comprehensively as possible the opinions and aspirations of members and friends of the UUCC. This will be accomplished in two ways. The first is a series of twelve "cottage meetings" to be held in July and August and possibly September. These

are relatively painless but vital ways for us to hear how you feel about the future of our congregation and our next minister. We need twelve volunteer host sites for gatherings of a maximum of ten participants. The hosts do nothing except open their door and perhaps provide a simple snack and beverage. Two members of the search committee will facilitate the brief discussion. The ball already is rolling on this phase, so please, if you have not done so by the time you read *The Common*, get in touch as soon as possible with Brooke or Emma to choose your day and date to host and select a time of the morning, afternoon, or evening. We will do the rest. All members and friends of the congregation are expected to attend and we urge you strongly to do so.



The second important early step is to develop a survey especially tailored to our congregation and its surrounding community. Elaine and Peter are working on this. Anne Price is keeping us on track by assuming recording secretary and treasurer duties. There are many other tasks that have been assigned and will fold into the process as we move forward.

As I hope you gather from the above, we are committed to keeping you informed as we navigate through this complex process and we encourage and hope to obtain full participation in the information gathering process. It is essential for us to provide a thorough and fair description of our congregation to prospective applicants and to clarify our own thinking so we can find and bring to you a minister who is the best match for our future together.

When we arrived, the goats called out to us, and we discovered that they liked to have us pet and feed them. Erik helped Colin milk the goats, and we watched Emma strain the milk. We fed a baby pig, a very large adult pig, and several sheep. And we found many garden beds with vegetables, herbs, and flowers. We could see that the farm provides a great deal of food for this family. And for lunch. they shared with us some of their delicious pork sausage. Thank you for having us!

As we continue in our summer program, we will share more with the congregation about our visit to the farm and experiences of "Getting to Know Each Other." For example, Elaine Gerard-Climo will tell us about the book she has written for children. And Nancy Guy will tell us about Birdsacre sanctuary. We are looking forward to others who might share with us, perhaps about a service project that would be attractive to our youth.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE OF RE On May 25, a group of parents, along with RE Chair Nancy Sayre, Rev. Charles Stephens, and me, discussed the future of the RE Program. The feedback was greatly appreciated, and we look forward to working on some changes. To begin, this summer we will reorganize the present RE room so that Charles can use the space as an office during the week and RE can use it for the youngest children on Sundays. The older children and youth in the program will use space in the Parish House. We also will work on programming that will involve our youth in an expanded community that would include get-togethers with other UU churches and working on service projects, such as: helping out at church, helping older church and community members with chores, and volunteering for community service projects such as Habitat for Humanity. This would be integrated with explorations of world religions and our Seven Principles.

If one had only our website calendar advising of church activities the logical result would be to think we had Sunday morning services and Tuesday evening AA meetings and little else. Accordingly, I am asking all committee chairs and other friends and members to send me emails indicating all scheduled meetings as well as significant actions taken that could be publicized. Any outside groups or organizations using the Meeting House or Parish House should also be mentioned. In that regard, I think we should include activities such as the farmers' market that will operate for the next 10-12 weeks. It is held right outside the Parish House, which is kept open as a courtesy to vendors and shoppers. Our web designer has been asked to post the changes. I will serve as the clearinghouse, gathering information from all sources and providing it to her for weekly updates.



Another step in the search process is the establishment of a negotiating team. The purpose of the negotiating team is to help determine the compensation package for the prospective minister. UUA guidelines suggest a negotiating team should have one member from the Search Committee, one member from the Governing Board, and one member from the general congregation, selected for experience and stature. During the retreat, Peter Fairbank

was selected as the Search Committee member. At its June meeting the Governing Board selected Treasurer Diana Bernard as its representative to the team. And the Board thought long-time member and former Finance Committee chair Standish Bourne would be ideal as the third member of the team. Stan has graciously agreed to serve in this capacity.

Due to scheduling conflicts, the task force established to explore options for additional church space either in an expanded Parish House or elsewhere has not been able to meet. We hope to meet soon and have progress to report on this important issue.

Those of you who read the Castine *Patriot* already know that town officials have approved our request to place the replica of the original sign on the side of the Meeting House facing the town green.

Finally, it is wonderful to see so many seasonal members and friends back in town and at the Meeting House. Welcome back! Please remember that the opinions and participation of <u>all</u> members and friends of the congregation are important as we move through the ministerial search process. We want your input.
